### **BENEFITS OF SPORTS FOR GIRLS**







#### **HEALTH BENEFITS**

- Girls with the highest physical activity during adolescence & young adulthood → 20% less likely to get breast cancer later in life
- Girls who participate in regular exercise experience lower rates of depression







#### **ACADEMIC & EMPLOYMENT GAINS**

- Young female athletes have higher grades, standardized test scores, and graduation rates compared to non-athletes
- Women who played sports in high school earn <u>7%</u> higher annual wages than their nonathlete peers
- Community sports are a gateway to school sports









# **TITLE IX PRIMER (BASIS FOR AB 2404)**







#### **TITLE IX**



- 47 year old federal law requiring gender equity in federallyfunded programs
- Requires that K-12 schools, colleges, and universities accepting federal funds treat female and male students equally, in academics and athletics
- Law = more than girls simply playing sports or comparing one "like" sport to another





#### **EQUITY IN SCHOOL - ANALYSIS**

- Review entire high school
   athletic program number of all
   athletes playing and experience
   of all athletes
- No exceptions for football
- Law requires Equal Participation
   Opportunities and Equal
   Treatment and Benefits
- No Retaliation







#### FOR EXAMPLE...





Boys' Baseball Field Grass

Girls' Softball Field Grass



Note: No female athletic facility made up for inequity between softball and baseball



#### **PROGRESS: THEN & NOW**

 Before Title IX passed (pre-1972) – less than 300,000 girls playing high school sports



- Today, more than 3,000,000 girls playing high school sports
- Today, boys receive over 4 million opportunities; girls left out / MORE TO DO for equity!





# AB 2404: Fair Play in Community Sports Act







# AB 2404 ("The Fair Play Act")

- Passed & signed into law: 2004
   Effective: 2005 (15 years old)
- Requires gender equity in youth competitive athletic programming offered by and hosted through park and recreation departments (includes 3rd parties)
- Private right of action lawsuit can be filed against agency / department
- Analysis of <u>Participation Opportunities</u> & <u>Treatment and Benefits</u>







# AB 2404 ("The Fair Play Act")



"No city, county, city and county, or special district,

shall discriminate against any person on the <u>basis of sex or</u> gender in the <u>operation</u>, <u>conduct</u>, <u>or administration</u> of **community youth athletics programs** OR

in the allocation of parks and recreation facilities and resources that support or enable these programs."





#### AB 2404: What & Where is Covered?

"parks and recreation facilities and resources" include, but are not limited to:

- athletic fields;
- athletic courts;
- gymnasiums;
- recreational rooms;
- restrooms;
- concession stands;
- storage spaces;
- lands and areas accessed through permitting & leasing



- sports and recreation equipment;
- devices used to promote athletics such as scoreboards, banners, and advertising;
- and all moneys used in conjunction with youth athletics.





# **Assessing Participation Opportunities**

- (1) Whether the selection of community youth athletics programs offered <u>effectively</u> <u>accommodate the athletic interests and abilitiof members of both genders</u>.
- Community typically →
   50% female and 50% male
- Actual team members, not just slots offered
- OR Show that <u>all interest of underrepresented</u> <u>gender is fully met (e.g., surveys of girls' interests)</u>







- (2) The provision **of moneys**, **equipment**, **and supplies**
- (3) **Scheduling** of games & practice times
- (4) Opportunity to receive **coaching**.
- (5) **Assignment and compensation** of coaches.
- (6) Access to lands and areas accessed through **permitting**, **leasing**.
- (7) **Selection of the season** for a sport.

- (9) Locker rooms.
- (10) Practice + competitive **facilities**.
- (11) **<u>Publicity</u>**.
- (12) **Officiation** by umpires, referees, or judges who have met training and certification standards.







#### **Equipment and Supplies**

- *E.g.*,
  - Uniforms
  - Balls
  - Goals
  - Rackets, bats
  - Protective gear







#### **Scheduling of Games and Practice Times**

- *E.g.*,
  - Primetime
     weekend slots
     vs. early morning
     and late night
     weekday slots







#### **Coaching**

- *E.g.*,
  - Assignment
  - Compensation
  - Number of coaches
  - Etc.



 Hypo: Former high school players w/ no coaching experience ≠ former competitive collegiate athletes





#### **Facilities**

- Locker rooms
- Practice grounds
- Competition grounds
- Concession stands
- Bathrooms
- Scoreboards
- Bleachers
- Etc.






California City, weather is
worst in winter and rain-outs
are common.

# **HYPO 1: Opportunities**

#### **City of Whoville**

- Size: 200 people
- 100 adults; 100 children under 18;
  50 boys & 50 girls
- Whoville Park and Recreation Department
- Offers basketball, baseball softball, soccer, tennis lessons, and cheer class



Who counts for participation under AB 2404?





# **HYPO 1: Opportunities**

#### Whoville Park & Recreation Dept.

#### 50 kids participating

10 girls on softball team
10 boys on baseball team
10 boys on soccer team
10 girls taking tennis lessons
10 girls learning cheer in
classes

#### <u>Totals</u>

10 athletic opportunities for girls
20 athletic opportunities for boys
\*\*lessons and cheer don't count

#### **NEED TO ADD**

10 Opportunities for girls, for proportionality (gold standard)

# **Hypo 2: Treatment & Benefits**

#### A Tale of Two Leagues

#### **LEAGUE 1: Whoville All-Stars**

- Coaches: former college players
- Uniforms: two sets of uniforms and new warm-ups
- Equipment: 5 bats, catchers' gear, mitts & new balls
- Facilities: re-conditioned field with lights
- Opening day parade



#### **LEAGUE 2: Whoville Players**

- Coaches: former high school players, no coaching experience
- **Uniforms**: one t-shirt
- Equipment: old balls, bring your own bats and mitts
- **Facilities**: soccer field without chalk or sprinklers; holes
- No opening day festivities







#### **HYPO 2: Treatment & Benefits**

- A Tale of Two Leagues
- Assess and make
   adjustments so that all girls
   and boys participating within
   all boys / all girls / coed
   leagues are getting
   equitable treatment and
   benefits








# PROMOTE GENDER EQUITY: ASSESS, ADJUST, & ACHIEVE

- **ASSESS** entire program (all leagues, including 3rd party) for gender inequity.
  - E.g., count all girls and boys playing
- **ADJUST** program to instill equity
  - *E.g.*, Greater outreach for female participants; re-think co-ed model
- <u>ACHIEVE</u> equity w/ persistent, regular, short & long-term action + monitoring
